Show, Don't Just Tell

Dear Murphy Students:

If you have ever taken a creative writing class, you may know the maxim: **show**, **don't tell**. In that context, it means, for example, don't just *tell* us a person is angry, *show* us that they are angry with their actions or words.

When writing your essays, the same rule applies: don't just *tell* us that "teachers can use many multimodal strategies to assist students" – *show* us *how* they can. Give us details, explanation, examples, or other evidence.

And, if you happen to be writing a personal statement or application, don't just *tell* the admissions representatives that you are passionate, hard-working, or dedicated to the field: *show them* how you are with details and examples.

Write so that even if you never told them you were passionate, they can still *see* your passion.

Questions to help you "Show, not just Tell"

What are you telling them? (What do you claim?)

- About a story, an article you read, a policy, a strategy, or your personal qualities?
- E.g., "The strategy is important" / "The policy is effective" / "I am passionate"

What evidence do you have? (How do you know?)

- What details, examples, quotes, observations, statistics, or personal stories?
- E.g., "Students remembered more after using the strategy" / "After the policy was put in place, people were able to get the help they needed" / "I spent my summers and free time volunteering at the library and helping children read."

Do you show them your evidence for every important point you make?
